
What's Current January 2016



As we mark the beginning of every year, Americans set ambitious resolutions, which are often thrown out the window by the end of January. This New Year, make a resolution to shrink your energy costs.

This checklist of long-term and short-term changes will improve your home's energy efficiency and increase your energy savings.

- 1. Install and set a programmable thermostat. You could save an estimated 10 percent per year on heating and cooling costs with a programmable thermostat. NOVEC recommends maintaining a temperature of 68 degrees for heating.
- 2. Use sunlight to your advantage. The sun's rays can contribute heat in the winter but force air conditioners and fans to work harder and use more energy in the summer. Using natural lighting effectively will also reduce the need to use artificial light.
- 3. Go ENERGY STAR. Your home's appliances and electronics account for close to 20 percent of your energy bills. Using ENERGY STAR[®] certified products which incorporate advanced technologies that use 10-15 percent less energy and water than standard models throughout your home could save nearly \$750 over the lifetime of the products.

- 4. Change your lighting. About 10 percent of the energy your home uses goes to lighting costs. By just replacing five of your home's most frequently used lights with energy-efficient ENERGY STAR bulbs, you could save \$75 a year in energy costs.
- 5. Use power strips. Many electronic devices and equipment continue to consume unnecessary energy even when not in use. Often called energy vampires, these devices cost families about \$100 a year. Use a power strip for electronic devices and turn it off when not in use to eliminate energy vampires.
- 6. Reduce energy for water heating. Water heating is a large energy expense in your home, accounting for about 14-18 percent of your utility bills. Make sure your water heater is set to no higher than 120 degrees, install low-flow showerheads, and insulate your hot water pipes.

NOVEC's 2016 PCA Credit is a Win for Customer-owners

For the fifth consecutive year, NOVEC customers will receive a power-cost-adjustment (PCA) credit on their monthly bills in 2016.

The 2016 adjusted rate is expected to be a credit of just over 1.2 ¢ per kilowatt-hour for the entire year. Pending the Virginia State Corporation Commission's final approval, this credit translates to an estimated reduction of \$15 per month on the average residential energy bill, which is about 1,200 kWh.

As a customer-owned cooperative, NOVEC is committed to controlling costs and purchasing electricity at the most competitive prices available. Also, as a regulated cooperative, NOVEC does not earn a profit on the wholesale power purchased or generated for its customer-owners. Therefore, any earnings above its power supply costs are returned to customers through a PCA credit.

"NOVEC customers will be paying less per kilowatt-hour for their energy used in 2016 than they were when NOVEC took over full responsibility for its power supply activities back in 2009," says Stan Feuerberg, NOVEC President & CEO. "The NOVEC team continues to stay focused to providing its customer-owners the absolute best price-value relationship for their power."


Five students who receive electric power from NOVEC will be selected for this all-expense-paid, once-in-a-lifetime trip.
